SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS DUE FEBRUARY 2ND

The deadline for submitting the Marathon High School Scholarship Application and all supplementary Marathon-affiliated scholarships is Friday, February 2nd. Seniors must submit their applications via the Google Classroom no later than 3:00 P.M. sharp! Late submissions will not be accepted.

Students are strongly encouraged to consistently check the [school website](#) for opportunities to apply for local, state and national scholarships they may be eligible for this year.

9TH - 11TH GRADE ASSESSMENTS MARCH 19, 2024

On Tuesday, March 19th, all 11th grade students are required to take the **ACT+Writing**, which will be administered digitally using school-issued Chromebooks.

The registration process for this exam occurs at school and there is no exam fee assessed to families. Additionally, students will have the option to select up to 4 colleges or universities that they would like to send their score to for free.

On Tuesday, March 19th, all 9th and 10th grade students are required to take the **Pre-ACT Secure**, which will be administered digitally using school-issued chromebooks.

All 9-11th grade students requiring additional test supports will be contacted by school officials to discuss exam administration dates and policies.





Current Sophomores and Juniors who elected to take college courses next school year (24-25) must return their Early College Credit / Start College Now / Distance Learning paperwork by Friday, February 9, 2024.

Students must also submit a Course Payment Agreement Form to be eligible for the course.

Students are encouraged to meet with Ms. Aune if they have any questions. Failure to turn in the required paperwork will result in removal from the college-level course.

BADGER BOYS STATE

Applications for Badger Boys State are now available. Junior males should see Ms. Aune if interested in attending this event, which runs June 9-15, 2024 at the University of Wisconsin - Eau Claire.

Badger Boys State educates young leaders on how to become more impactful community members of Wisconsin.

During the program, high school students between their junior and senior years learn how our government system works by creating their own city, county, and state level governments. Do you have questions on how to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)? The FAFSA is the form a student needs to complete to apply for financial aid, such as grants and loans. Plan to attend a College Goal Wisconsin event in-person or virtually to receive free information and assistance completing the FAFSA.



You will need the following items in order to complete your 2024-25 FAFSA. If you are considered a dependent student for financial aid purposes, you will also need these items for your parent(s).

- 2022 Federal Tax Return and W2s
- 2022 Untaxed Income Records, such as child support or veteran's non-education benefits
- Information on savings, investments, business assets and farm assets (if applicable)
- Driver's License (if you have one)
- Cell phone (if you have one)
- Social Security Number
- Alien Registration Card or Permanent Resident Card (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Date of birth for parents
- Month and year of parents' marriage, divorce, or separation
- FSA ID (if you have one). To create an FSA ID, please visit studentaid.gov. Every student and at least one parent if the student is considered a dependent student needs one

It is highly recommended that a dependent student attend the event with a parent so the FAFSA can be submitted that day.

In support of **Money Smart Wisconsin (April 6 - 13, 2024)**, the [Wisconsin Coalition on Student Debt](#) and its partner organizations are sponsoring a Money Smart 2024 Scholarship Contest. Wisconsin's graduating high school seniors are encouraged to answer this year's Money Smart Question for a chance to win one of several scholarships to be given as a \$1,000 Edvest account.

Student loan debt in Wisconsin for students who graduated with a bachelor's degree in 2023 averaged \$31,550. About two-thirds of all college students take out loans to pay for their educational costs.

We want to hear your plan to pay for college, how the cost of college and potential student debt you may incur will affect your career choices, and what impact this scholarship may have for you.

THE 2024 ESSAY – use each bullet below to form your essay.

- Describe your plan to pay for college. Include a summary of the various costs (tuition, housing & food/meal plan, textbooks, computer, fees, transportation, other cost of attendance expenses).
Tip: To help estimate expenses, look for your intended school at the US Department of Education website (<https://collegecost.ed.gov/net-price>) or search the name of your school + net price calculator.
- Once you've summarized the estimated cost explain how you plan to pay for college.
 - Discuss the various resources (i.e., grants, scholarships, student aid, jobs, financial support from family) you will need to attend and complete a degree at your chosen college.
 - Did you complete the [Free Application for Federal Student Aid](#) FAFSA?
 - If you plan to take out educational loans, how will you minimize and/or manage your student loan debt?
 - How does your potential student loan debt compare to the potential salary in your chosen field?
- Finally, describe your understanding of the cost of college and educational debt.
 - How will you manage any student debt in relation to your expected future salary?
 - How will it impact your life over the next few years?
 - Include ideas on how you plan to manage your money, school and/or work responsibilities and ultimately meet your college and career goals.

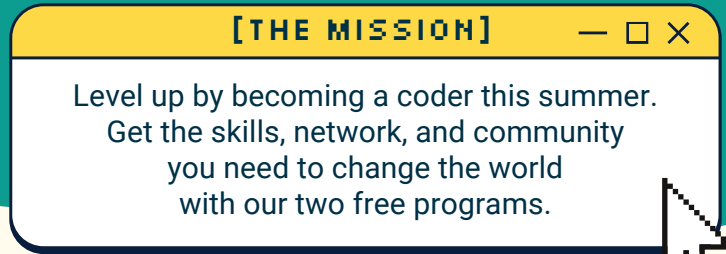

Mental Health Language

STIGMA

Stigma is when someone views a person in a negative way just because they have a mental health condition. Stigma often stems from lack of understanding or fear and can lead to discrimination. One contributing factor to the stigma around mental illness is language. Decreasing stigma through language helps to increase support and awareness for people living with a mental illness.

SAY THIS - NOT THAT

Common Phrases



PERSON-FIRST LANGUAGE

Person-first language places the emphasis on the individual, rather than on their diagnosis or condition. A person is not their disorder, they are neighbors, parents, siblings, professionals, friends, family, colleagues, loved ones. The person should always be placed first, then their condition second. Using person-first language can help to reduce and eliminate stereotypes and stigma.

MENTAL ILLNESS LANGUAGE

Some terms you may hear when someone refers to their personal mental health issues include "peer," "survivor," "person with lived experience," or "person in recovery," among others. Mental health providers still routinely use the terms "consumer," "client," and "patient" depending on the specific treatment setting. At NAMI, we use the terms "peer" to describe anyone who identifies as living with a mental illness, and "family member" to describe anyone with a loved one who lives with a mental illness.

Your language matters, thank you for making a conscious effort to reduce stigma and discrimination for those living with a mental illness and their families.
